INTERVALS

The distance between two notes or two keys is called an interval.

Intervals are measured and named according to the number of notes or keys involved.

In measuring intervals we count all the notes; the two notes of the interval *and* the notes (white keys) between the two.



THE 2ND (SECOND): LIKE A STEP

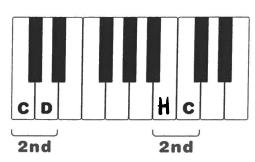


ON THE KEYBOARD

A 2nd is the distance from one white key to the next white key, up or down.

ON THE STAVE

A 2nd is the distance from a line to the next space, or from a space to the next line.

THE 3RD (THIRD): LIKE A SKIP

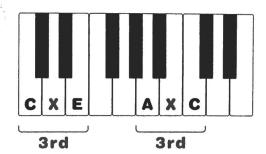


ON THE KEYBOARD

A 3rd is the distance between two white keys with one white key in between them.

A 3rd is the distance from a line to the next line, or from a space to the next space.



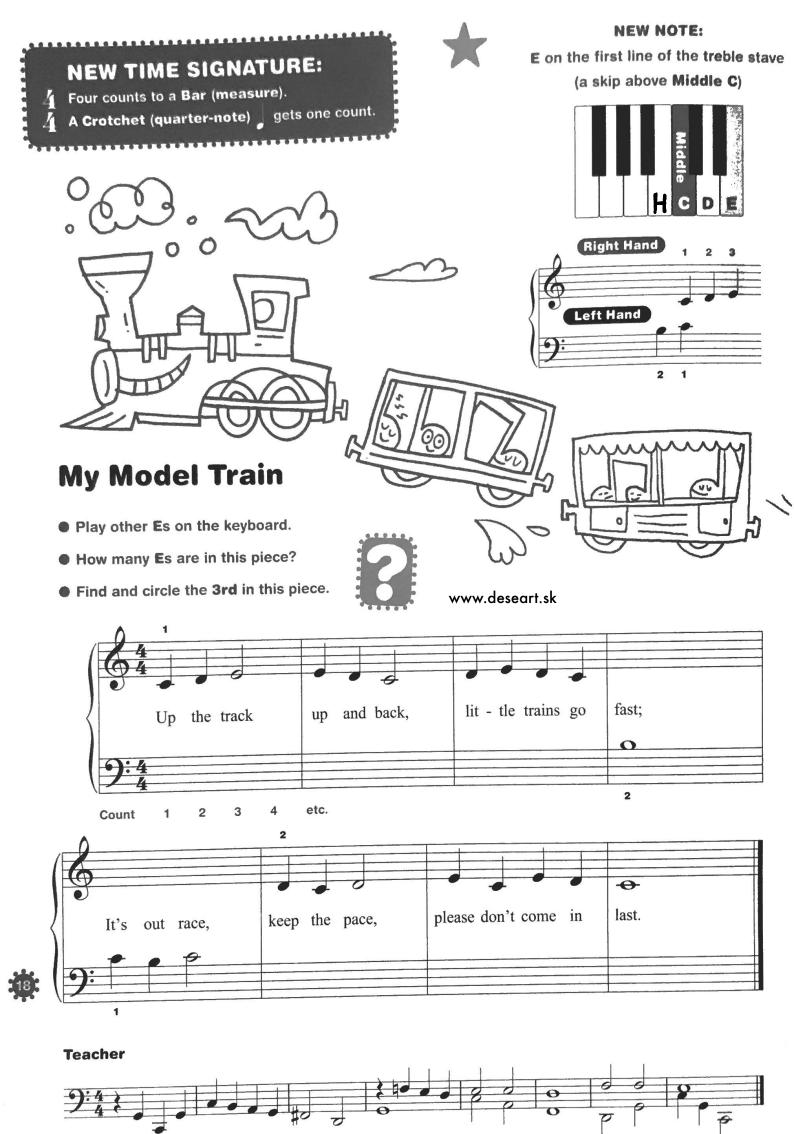

A 4th is the distance between two white keys with two keys in between them (X X).



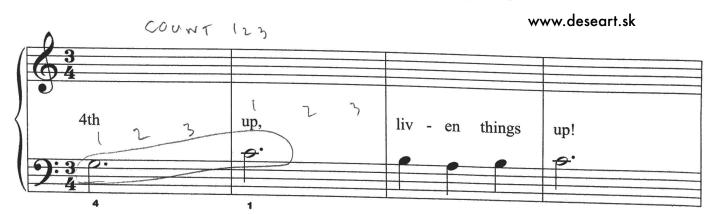


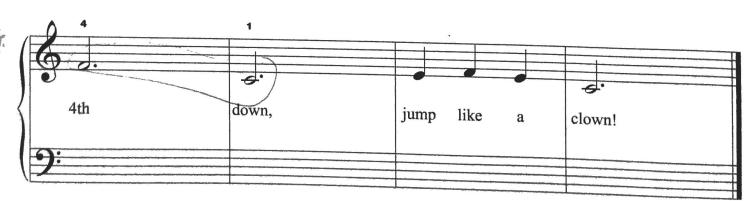

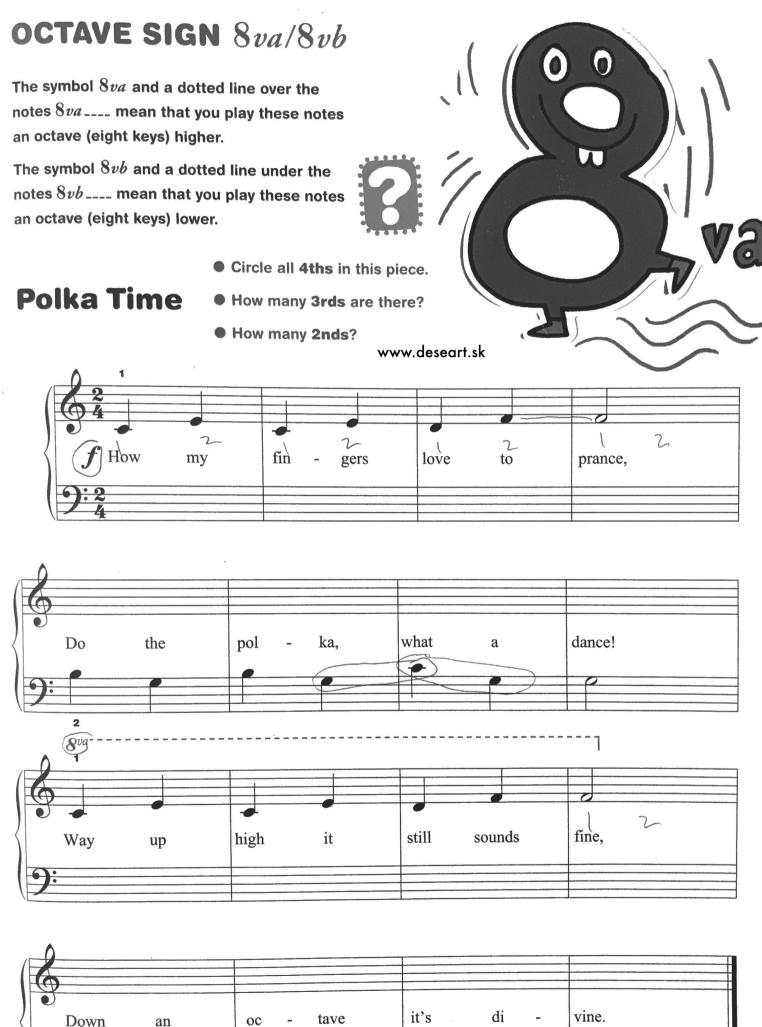
A 4th is the distance from a line to a space, or from a space to a line, with a line and a space skipped.

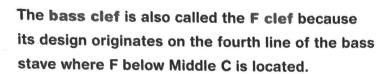




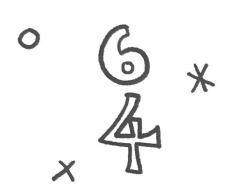


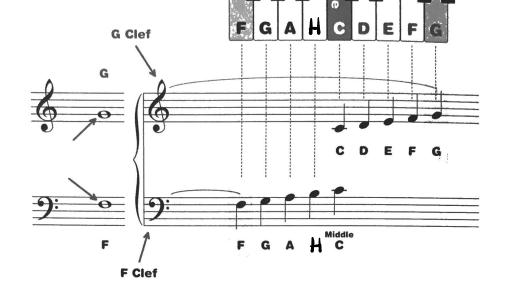
The treble clef is also called the G clef because its graceful design curls around the second line of the treble stave where the G above Middle C is located.

Notice that the two dots of the F clef surround the F line.

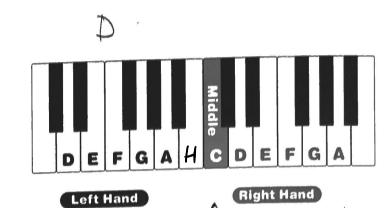
THE SLUR AS LEGATO MARK



The slur is a curved line placed over or under two or more notes. It indicates the smooth, connected manner of playing called legato.



Legato an Italian word, means 'bound together'. The notes bound together by a slur are to be played without any break or gap between the notes; a depressed key is allowed to rise only when the next key is depressed by another finger.







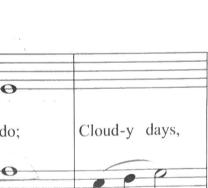


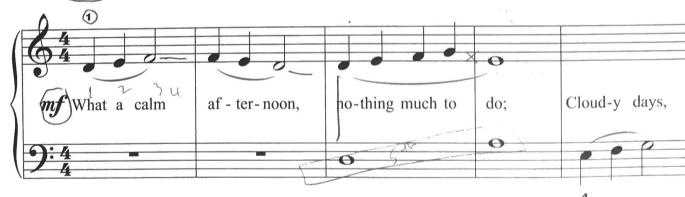


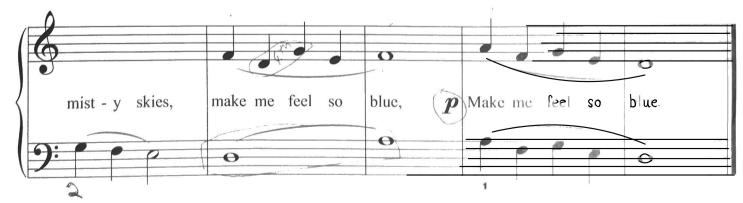

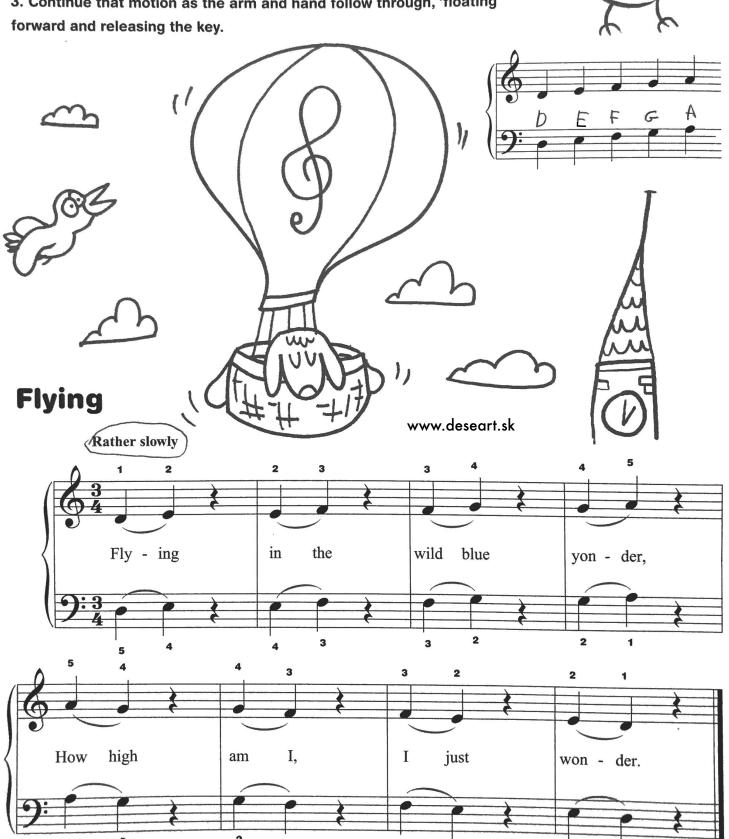
TWO-NOTE SLURS

A two-note slur has two notes played legato, with a graceful 'release' on the second note.

Playing a Two-Note Slur:

- 1. 'Fall' into the first key (from a high wrist to level with forearm) letting the weight of the hand and arm 'sink' into the key.
- 2. Play the second note with legato touch and a graceful rise of the wrist.

3. Continue that motion as the arm and hand follow through, 'floating'



MELODIC & HARMONIC INTERVALS

Notes played one after another form a melody. The interval between two notes of a melody is called a melodic interval. Name these melodic intervals.

Two or more notes sounded together form harmony. The intervals between two notes sounded together is called a harmonic interval. Name these harmonic intervals:









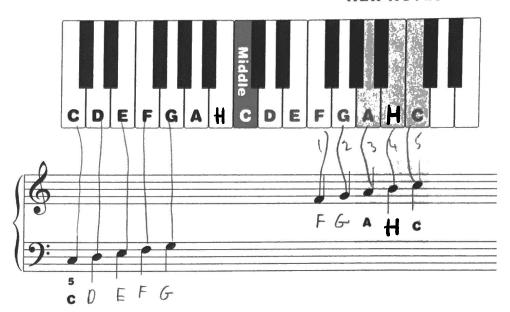

QUAVERS



This is a quaver (eighth-note).
It looks like a **crotchet** (quarter-note) with a little flag.





These are two quavers.

Two quavers are connected with a beam instead of being drawn with individual flags.





Two quavers equal the time value of one crotchet, one count.

Count quavers this way:





Clap hands on every note and count aloud.

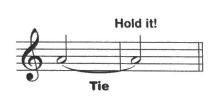




THE TIE

A **Tie** is a curved line connecting two neighbouring notes that are on the same line or in the same space. When two such notes are tied together we play only the first note and *hold* the second note without striking the key again.



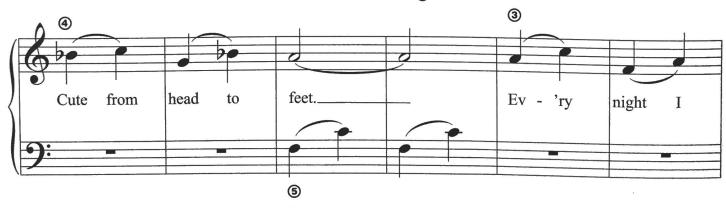


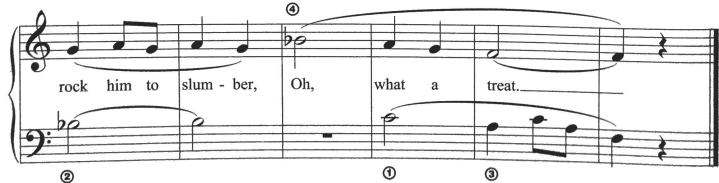


- Remember the difference between a slur (the sign of legato) and a tie.

INCOMPLETE BARS

A melody can start on any beat of the bar, not only on the first one.



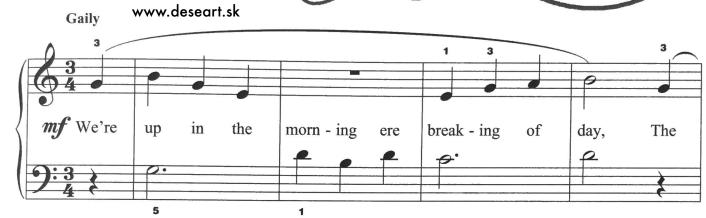
'Cowboy Song' starts on the last beat of the bar, on count 'three.' This note will complete the missing beat in the last bar.

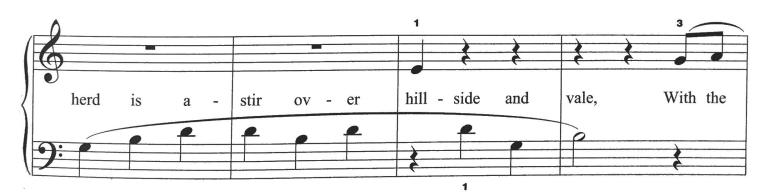

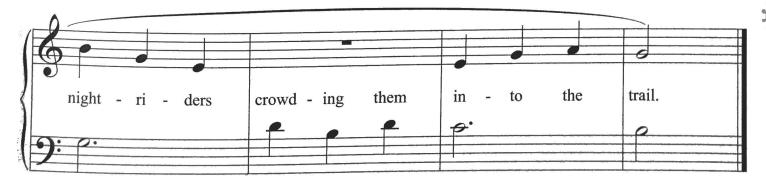








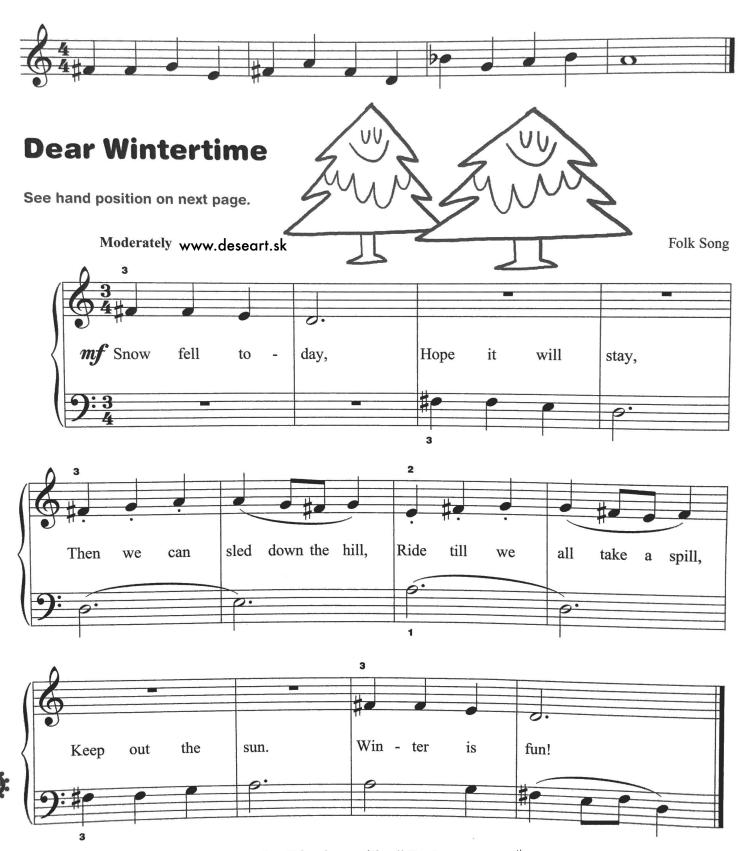




MORE ABOUT SHARPS & FLATS

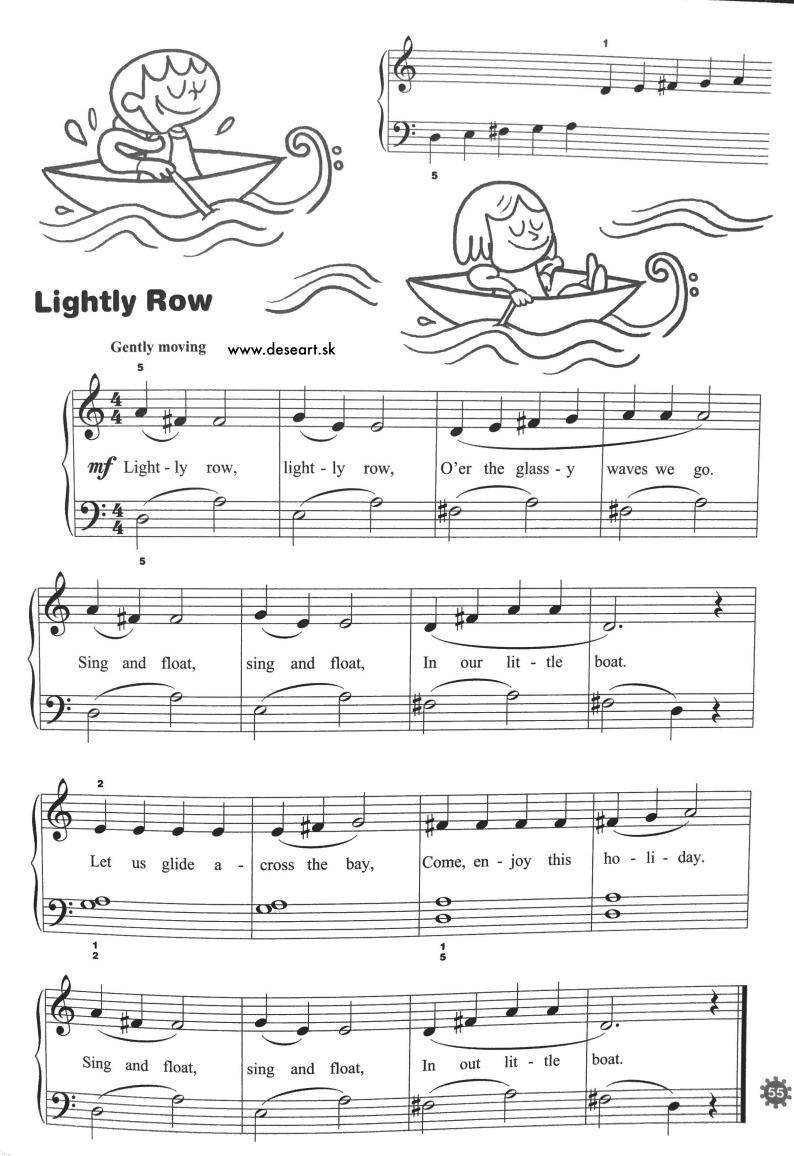
Sharps and flats alter not only the note in front of which they stand, but also all other notes on the same line or in the same space for the rest of that one bar (measure).

• Circle those notes which have to be raised or lowered, even though they do not have a sharp or flat in front of them.

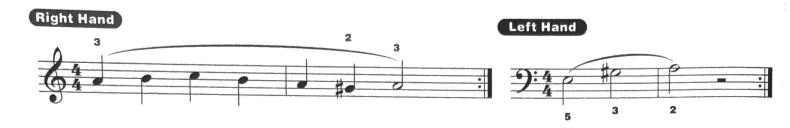

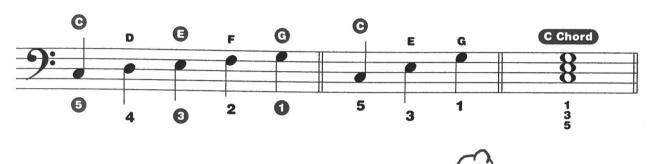


CHORDS

Three notes played together form a chord. There are various types of chords.

 Place your right hand on the keyboard in a five-finger position, with the first finger on any white key. With fingers 1-3-5 strike three keys together in doing so you play the simplest type of chord, called a triad.

This is how you find the C chord (for the left hand).



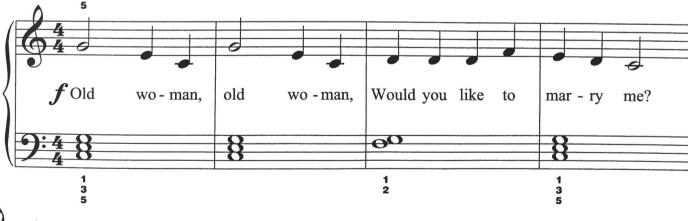

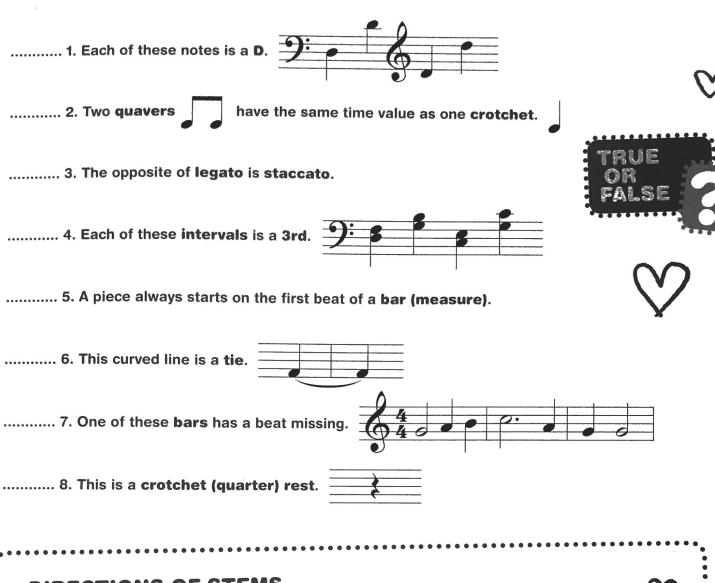












DIRECTIONS OF STEMS

Notes on or above the middle (third) line have stems pointing down, touching the notehead on the left side.



Notes below the middle (third) line have stems pointing up, touching the notehead on the right side.

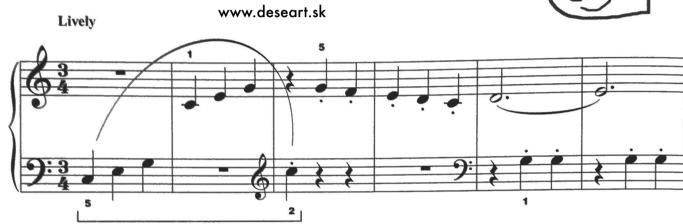


PEDAL

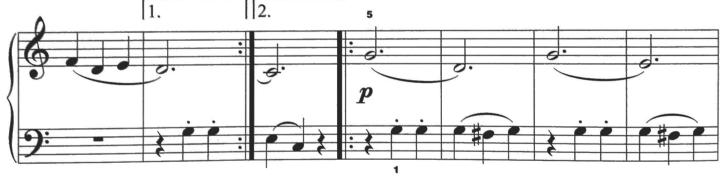
The right pedal of the piano, when depressed, sustains the sound. Depress the pedal silently with the ball of your right foot (the heel stays on the floor).

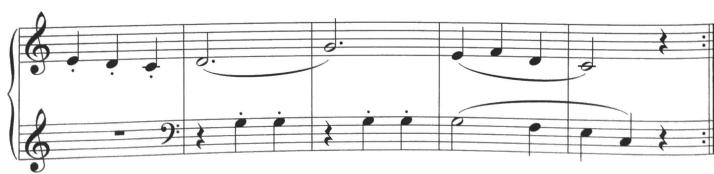

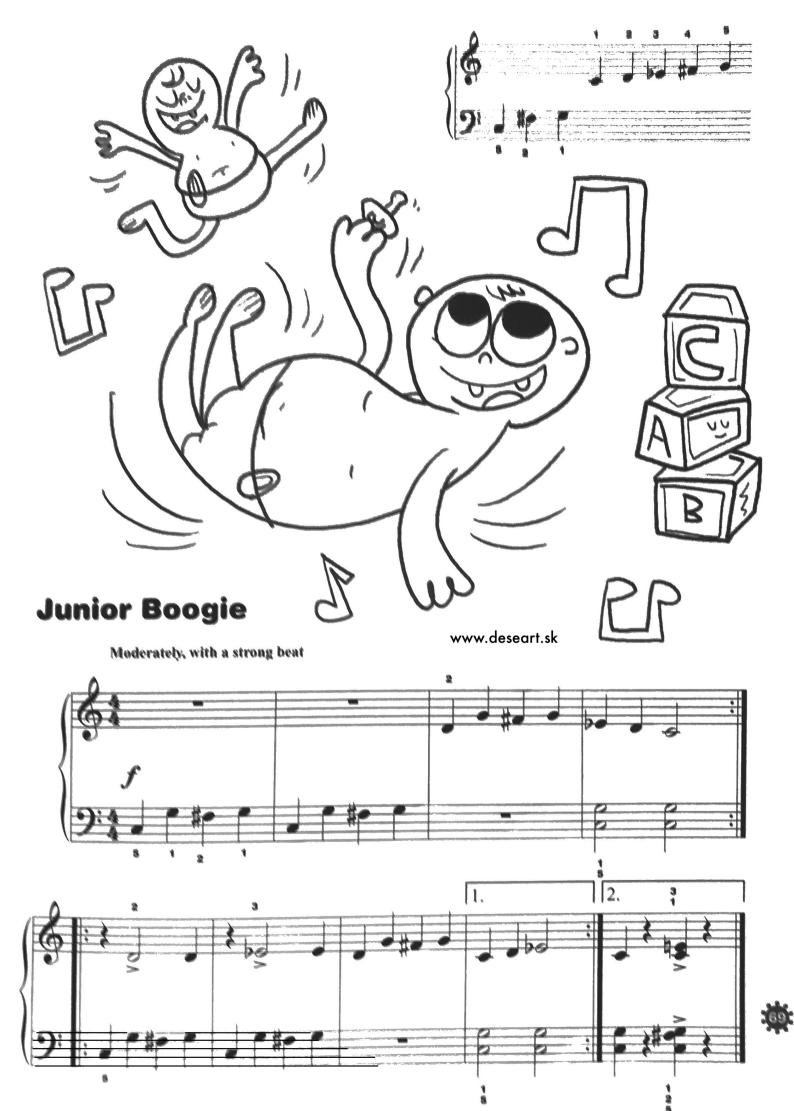

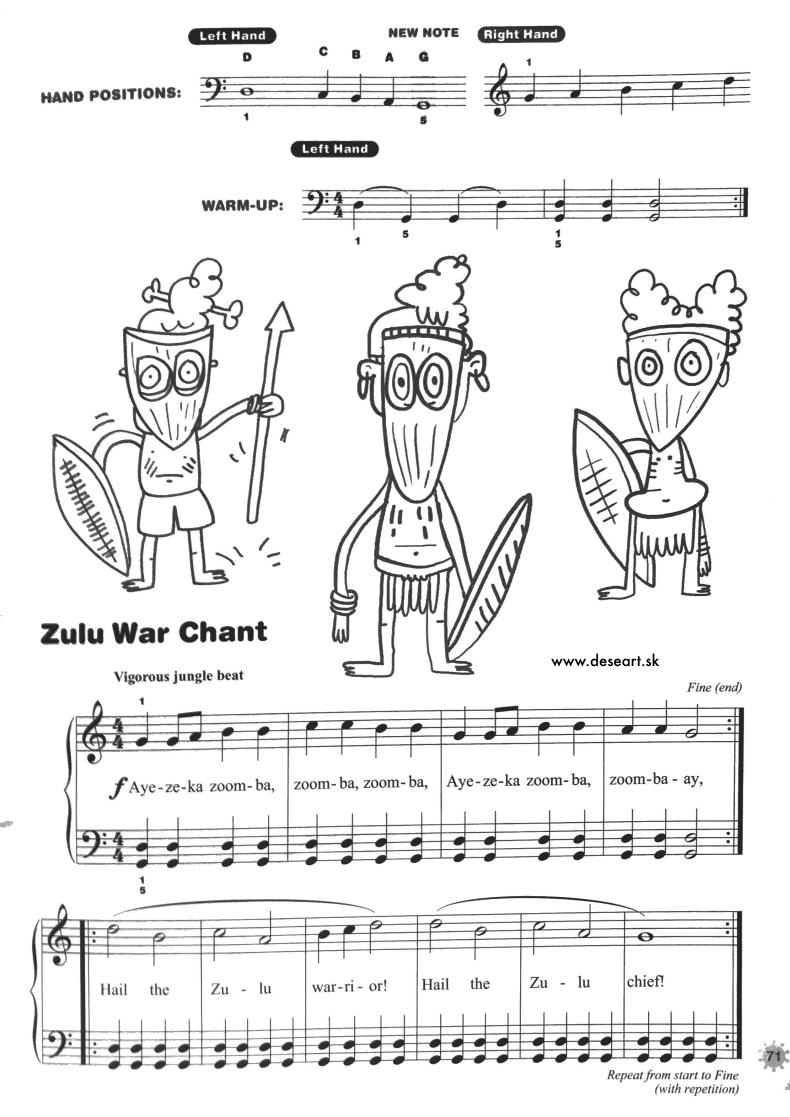












Accent Mark: > stress the note.

Bar: the segment of music between two *Barlines* on the Stave.

Barlines: vertical lines dividing the stave into bars (measures).

Bass Clef: 9: indicates lower notes on the stave, usually played by the left hand.

Chord: three notes played together.

Crescendo (cresc.): gradually louder.

Crotchet (quarter-note): (one count).

Diminuendo (dim.): gradually softer.

Dotted Minim (half-note): (three counts).

Double Barline: indicates the end of a piece.

f forte: loud.

F Clef: another name for the Bass Clef.

Fine: (fee-nay) the end.

Flat: | lowers the note by a semitone.

Forte: loud.

G Clef: another name for the Treble Clef.

Grand Stave: a Treble Stave and a Bass Stave connected by a vertical line and a brace (bracket).

Interval: the distance between two notes.

Legato: smooth, connected manner of playing; marked by a *Slur*.

Letter names of the keys: A B C D E F G (the musical alphabet).

mf mezzo forte: medium loud.

Middle C: the white key just to the left of the two black keys in the middle of the keyboard.

Minim: (two counts).

mp mezzo piano: medium soft.

Natural Sign: cancels a Sharp or a Flat.

Note: a written symbol representing a tone.

Note Value: the duration or length of a note.

Octave: the interval of eight notes (both notes of the interval have the same letter name).

p piano: soft.

Pedal: part of the piano mechanism which, when depressed by the right foot, sustains the sound.

Phrase: a melody unit, usually two to four bars in length.

Piano: soft.

Quaver (eighth-note): (one half count).

Repeat Sign: : means repeat the preceding section.

Rest Signs: Crotchet (quarter) rest.

Minim (half) rest. Semibreve (whole) rest.

Rhythm: the sound pattern formed by a group of notes and pauses of various lengths.

Ritardando (rit.): gradually slower.

Semitone: the distance between one key and the very next key, black or white.

Semibreve (whole-note):

(four counts).

Sharp: raises the note by a semitone.

Skip: when notes skip from a line to the next line, or from a space to the next space.

Siur: a curved line over or under a note group, indicating *Legato*.

Staccato (stacc.): a detached manner of playing, indicated by a dot over or under the note.

Step: when notes move stepwise from a space to the next line or from a line to the next space.

Tempo: the rate of speed in music.

Tie: a curved line connecting two neighbouring notes on the same line or in the same space.

Time Signature: two numbers written at the beginning of a piece, indicating the number of beats in a *bar* and the type of *note* that gets one count.

Treble Clef: indicates higher notes, usually played by the right hand.

Triad: a *chord* consisting of three notes; the root (lowest note), with the intervals of the 3rd and the 5th.

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
